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Pupils' Welfare

Mental Health and wellbeing are a priority for our school. At BIGS the form tutor is responsible for overseeing their form's personal and academic welfare and is normally the first point of contact for parents. More complicated or weighty issues are often dealt with by our school pastoral support worker and or Mrs Sadia Waseem (School DSL) jointly with the form tutor. The purpose of the PSW is to support the pastoral needs of pupils to ensure that behaviour, safety, and well-being targets are met for all pupils. Ms Chohan will be working closely with staff, students and parents.

If your child is absent from school you should ring the school on the school numbers: 01204 771570 or Text: 07508512638. If you are going to be away from home while your child is attending school please let us know in advance where your child will be staying and whom we should contact in emergency. Similarly if your contact details change, please ensure that you inform us so that we can update our records.

What to eat?

At our school pupils bring in a packed lunch, and we have a no junk food policy whereby fizzy drinks and unhealthy snacks are not allowed. This is put in to place in accordance with recent scientific research which proves that such foods do affect a student's learning ability. We are also trying to encourage our daughters to appreciate the importance of healthy eating as Islamically our bodies have a right over us. We do have a tuck shop inside school, allowing students to purchase cold drinks and healthy snacks.

What to wear?

The BIGS school uniforms can be ordered and bought from school. This is a black Jubba and Hijab that must be purchased from school as they have the school logo attached. The school also have their own PE kit. This includes a PE top and bottoms with a PE scarf (especially designed and approved by health and safety regulations). The students must wear suitable plain black shoes/trainers during school hours and trainers or pumps for PE.

We have a strict uniform policy in School and students are not allowed to wear make-up or nail polish or jewelry.

Parents should be aware that jewelry is confiscated and students are asked to wash off any make-up that they try to come into school with.

Students are not allowed to bring in any perfumes or spray deodorant and must only bring in roll-on deodorant. If any sprays are bought into school, they will be confiscated.

Mobile Phones

BIGS does not allow learners to use mobile phones in school at all. We do not encourage any learners to bring phones into School. However, if students do have a mobile phone, this must be handed into the form teacher at the start of the day and collected at the end of the day. The school does not take any liability should the phone get damaged or lost. If students are caught using the mobile phone during the normal school day, the phone will be confiscated and parents will be responsible for collecting the phone from the School office.

Homework

At BIGS we recognize that Homework is a very important extension of the students learning journey. Students will be issued with regular home work in all subject areas. Students are given a homework diary at the beginning of the year which teachers and parents sign on a regular basis to ensure home works are being completed on time. These diaries are also used to help create a dialogue between parent and teacher should any issues occur.

Assessments

Assessments are continually occurring through summative or formative methods at the discretion of the teachers. When work is marked, staff will indicate what is correct and identify areas that can be improved by adding appropriate comments. The standards for marking and grading students are set according to the National Curriculum. Students are constantly reminded about the level that they are working at and what they need to do improve.

Students transition

The transition from Primary to Secondary School is an important time in a child's life and at BIGS we want this process to be as smooth as possible. Hence each child is allocated a form teacher that takes the responsibility of making this transition an easy one. It is strongly acknowledged that when a child feels happy and secure at school they will enjoy both academic success and social well-being. If you have any concerns in either aspect of your daughter's education, we would welcome a call from you so that together we can swiftly resolve any problems as they arise.

Expectations at Bolton Islamic Girls School

In the pupil homework diaries you will find a partnership agreement which lists the expectations of the parent, student and school in your daughter's education.

With regard to class and homework you should expect that we will do our best to provide lessons and homework which will enable pupils to achieve high standards of learning. Likewise

BIGS expects the student to work hard in lessons and complete all homework to a level that enhances their learning.

As a parent, we expect you to develop your daughter's learning; listed below are some tips which will help you to do this;

- 1. Provide a suitable work area. Your daughter should have somewhere quiet and free from clutter at home where they can carry out their home learning.
- 2. Regularly ask your daughter about what they have learnt that day and if they satisfied all of the learning objectives outlined to them by their teachers. If there have been any difficulties, discuss with your daughter how you can work together to complete the learning. This may be by using books at home or research on the internet.
- 3. Take an active interest in your daughter's home learning and ensure that they have a good homework routine and that you sign their planner regularly. Homework is best done on the night set and your child should be helped to structure their routine. Don't struggle for too long if home tasks are particularly challenging. If they have done the allotted time and are still struggling, write a note in the book or planner, confirming the correct time was spent on the task.
- 4. If they are struggling with a certain subject during home learning refer to the 'how to help your daughter' section for the relevant subject in this booklet. Be prepared to invest a lot of time when your daughter first starts to work through the various home learning activities and determine the best way that your child makes progress from them.
- 5. If your daughter is absent it is vital that they catch up the missed learning. It is your daughter's responsibility to contact the appropriate teachers when they return from absence and find out what they have missed. In long periods of absence, contact the form tutor.

We do appreciate your support in this matter and know that encouragement from home really does help to maximize a student's performance.

Bolton Islamic Girls School FEE REGULATIONS

1. WHAT ARE THE FEES?

'Fees' means school tuition fees at the rate set from time to time and current at the start of each academic year. September 2023 fees is £2300.

'Extras' means items authorised by parents or reasonably incurred by a pupil or by the school on behalf of a pupil and normally charged as extras; for these purposes a pupil is the agent of the parents.

Fees are normally reviewed once a year. It may be necessary to increase fees from time to time and, notice will be given before the end of academic year.

2. WHEN AND HOW MUCH DO I PAY?

Parents are required to pay school tuition fees according to the schedule given below. There are 2 options:

OPTION 1: ANNUALLY £2300 - Single Payment

OPTION 2: TERMLY - Mandatory first term's fee in by 15th September £1150.00

Followed by one Termly payments as follows: 2nd Term's fees £1150 (payable by 15th January)

In special circumstances only, one further option may be considered:-

OPTION 3: Monthly instalments of £329 per month, by the 11th of each month for 7 months.

OTHER NOTES:

Any arrangement for payment by instalments may be cancelled by BIGS should parents fail to meet their commitments. Upon cancellation, any outstanding fees shall become payable immediately.

Please be aware that there is an additional *GCSE* examination fee which parents are required to pay in either year 10 or year 11 depending on when the students sit their exams. The amount payable is subject to the number of examinations your child sits and will be payable during the course of the academic year.

3. HOW CAN I PAY?

Payment can be made either by Bank Transfer, Standing Order or Cheque.

Cheque: If you choose to pay by cheque, your payment must be cleared by the due date. Any cheques must be handed in at least 4 working days before the deadline date, in order for the cheques to clear by the bank. Please note that if you send a cheque and it bounces, you will be liable for the bank and admin charge of £25.00. All cheques are payable to Bolton Islamic Girls School.

Standing Order: This is the preferred method of payment. This will reduce paperwork and the need for you to come to our offices to make payments. Please fill out our Standing Order Mandate and give it to your bank. The admin office must be notified if this is your preferred method of payment.

Bank Transfer. This payment method is only applicable for Option 1 or Option 2.

4. HOW CAN I SECURE A PLACE FOR MY CHILD AT THE SCHOOL?

To secure a place for your child for the next academic year, you must pay the admission fee of £200. This is non-refundable.

5. WHAT IF I CANNOT PAY THE FEES?

We expect everyone to meet their obligations in full without exception. Parents may if they so wish apply for financial support to outside aid agencies, however, the decision of such agencies in providing assistance is not the responsibility of the school and will not be accepted as a reason for any delay in making fee payments on time.

6. WHAT HAPPENS IF I MISS A PAYMENT?

If we do not receive the fees in cleared funds by this date, we will send you a reminder text/call, requesting that payment is made within the next 7 days. Once A second reminder is sent out the matter is addressed with the Governors and more strict action is taken accordingly. Your child will not be allowed to attend school whilst we await fees payment.

ADMIN CHARGE & EXCLUSION:

If you are not up to date in all your payments by the following dates, a £25 admin charge will also apply: 15th **September**, 15th **January**, and or monthly plan on 11^{th} of each month. Please note the admin charge cannot be removed once it is applied.

We will exclude a child from school, even at exam time, if all sums due to date are not cleared before the above mentioned dates:

This exclusion will apply even if you have paid the fees, but have neglected to pay the admin charge.

Parents of pupils in Year 11 (the final year) must ensure that the all fees are settled before March of that year to enable the child to sit GCSE examinations. The School may withhold any information and property whenever fees are overdue. The School may disclose the fact and amount of any unpaid fees to another school which the pupil attends or proposes to attend.

A pupil will be deemed to have been withdrawn without notice if any fees remain unpaid one calendar month after exclusion for non-payment of fees. Accordingly, a term's fee will be payable forthwith.

7. DISCOUNTS, CONCESSIONS & SCHOLARSHIPS: WHAT IF I HAVE MORE THAN ONE CHILD AT THE SCHOOL?

Currently, there are no Scholarships and Discounts operated, but should they become available then it will be advertised as appropriate.

8. ARE FEES REFUNDED FOR UNAUTHORISED ABSENCE?

Fees will not be refunded for any absence. Any child who is, without prior written permission from the Head teacher, absent from class for 2 weeks or portions thereof will need to notify school with an explanation. If the child remains absent for a 3rd week or portions thereof without adequate explanation, the child's place may be offered to others on the Waiting List without further warning. Any fees paid will not be refunded under such circumstances.

9. WHAT IS A WRITTEN NOTICE?

Parents must give a term's advance written notice before withdrawing a child from the school or a term's fee will be payable in lieu. Notice given by parents only operates when submitted in writing to the school secretary and received by the school. Notice given orally or to any other person will not be considered valid. Written notice received before the first day of term expires at the end of the term. Written notice received on or after the first day of term expires at the end of the following term.

10. CAN I RECEIVE A REFUND OF FEES?

If a parent has paid in advance he/she may be entitled to a refund. This however is conditional on there being no financial loss to the school and provided the child's place is filled by another on the Waiting List. The deposit will be held on account for such cases.

Fees will not be refunded or waived for absence through sickness or if a term is shortened or a vacation extended or if a pupil is sent home before the normal end of term or for any other cause.

11. FEE PAYMENT AGREEMENT FORM

All parents are required to complete and sign the fee payment agreement form as soon as possible. The link for the form is here: *Fee Payment Agreement Form*

Please note any students on roll in school are already bound to this agreement.

Religious Curriculum

At BIGS the curriculum refers not only to the National Curriculum but Islamic Studies are taught and learnt at the same pace as the other subjects.

The curriculum of some religious core subjects is briefly explained below.

Holy Quran
In Tajweed we will teach students the principles of how to recite the Quran with the correct articulation, prolongation, merging, conversion, distinctness, and pauses. We will teach the student and have her practice the rules of Tajweed. Year 7 will be introduced to the following units of tajweed: Introduction to tajweed, Why do we learn tajweed? The command to learn Tajweed, Benefits of Tajweed, Principles of Tajweed, Prostrations of reading, Levels of reciting the Quran, Errors in recitation, Symbols of Stop-ping, The makhaarij, Characteristics of letters and introduction to noon sakinah and tanween, rules of meem sakinah, tashdeed and maddaat. Pupils will learn by heart a number of Small Surahs, depending upon the class's Scheme of work. A medium sized chapter will also be translated and explained during the year. From time to time we will test students orally in the recitation of Quran. Students who have already memorized tajweed of Quran will follow the same plan of study and will learn to identify the rules of Tajweed from the Quranic text and from memory.
Practicing the rules of Tajweed and reading and listening to the recitation of Quran. Thorough practice recitation in groups and individually is also helpful. If the students apply all the Tajweed rules whilst reading the Holy Quran every time, they will get habitual in reading the Holy Quran right and with Tajweed.
Ask the student to recite Quran everyday at home as it is preferred in Islam.

Subject	Religious Education
Course Descriptor	In Religious Education pupils will begin the year by asking the question Does God Exist? Pupils will examine the traditional arguments Muslims give to support their belief in God. They will evaluate these through discussion and written work. They will also explore the scientific account of the origins of the universe. This will lead to a unit on Islam exploring the origins, beliefs and traditions of this monotheistic tradition. Pupils will reflect on what they can learn from this faith and evaluate Islamic teachings in light of their own experience. Finally, pupils will explore the emotive subject of suffering? By exploring images and concepts of suffering pupils will reflect on the issues and questions which arise. They will consider questions such as 'why?' and attempt to give responses to this problem.
How to progress	Pupils need to work accurately describing in detail the various beliefs and customs of Islam. Over the year these descriptions will need to develop into explanations as pupils ask why Muslims believe and behave in the way they do. In writing tasks pupils should be using the term 'because' to explain how beliefs and values make a difference to communities and individuals and consider counter arguments.
How to help your child	Homework tasks involve open questions where students are asked to reflect on what they believe and why in light of Islam. Discussing these issues at home gives pupils vocabulary to express their views and opportunities to reflect.

How to progress	Pupils need to work accurately describing in detail the various beliefs and aspects of Islam. In given tasks students are expected to memorise excerpts of information and will be assessed by the teacher using varied assessment for learning tasks throughout the year.					
How to help your child	Due to the intensity of the course it is strongly encouraged that parents continually monitor and make sure that students complete homework tasks on time. Encourage the students by speaking to them about their subject knowledge and monitor their implementation of it at home. Praising and expressing the importance of such acts will support this learning.					

ISLAMIC TEACHINGS AT BIGS

At BIGS we start and end our day with the recitation of Quran as well as starting and ending lessons with Quran. Students are reminded every morning and in assemblies to pray Daily Azkhaars to encourage them to continually be in the remembrance that Allah is watching me, listening to me and is with me.

On Thursday mornings Assembly is typically focused on Islamic reminders. On Friday assembly, students sit together to do a collective Zikr and Read Surah Alkhaf together.

Quran Lessons

All year groups have Quran lessons taught throughout the week. Students learn the principles of how to recite the Quran with the correct articulation, prolongation, merging, conversion, distinctness, and pauses. Students are also given an Introduction to tajweed, Why do we learn tajweed? The command to learn Tajweed, Benefits of Tajweed, Principles of Tajweed, Prostrations of reading, Levels of reciting the Quran, Errors in recitation, Symbols of Stop-ping, The makhaarij, Characteristics of letters and introduction to noon sakinah and tanween, rules of meem sakinah, tashdeed and maddaat.

From time to time we will test students orally in the recitation of Quran. Students who have already memorized tajweed of Quran will follow the same plan of study and will learn to identify the rules of *Tajweed* from the Quranic text and from memory.

SALAH times monitoring

A new online monitoring system is currently being used by the Aalima teachers to help support and monitor learners to pray Salah. During Winter months' students know that they have to pray Zuhr in School and this is strictly monitored and logged. Younger year groups are also given a separate prayer log book to help them to stay on track and pray the 5 prayers. This is monitored by the Aalima teacher.

All report cards include a 'prayer effort' grade in order to encourage parents to also be involved with this aspect of a student's progress.

Lessons in Aalima

Students typically have 4 lessons a week in Aalima working towards a diploma level course in Aalima over the course of 5 years in School. The course is taught in a way to ensure that all information is simplified for their understanding and is taught using modern methods and visual aids.

Figh (Rules and Regulations) We teach according to Imam Abu Hanifa's jurisprudence and emphasise on the correct methodology to perform wudu, ghusl, salah and other compulsory acts.

Aqeedah (Belief) Is according to Ahle-sunnah-wal Jammah. Learning basic beliefs such as the seven articles of faith alongside an emphasis on the importance of understanding the love of Allah and the prophet (peace be upon them).

Seerah (history of Islam): taught from the Sealed Nectar students are able to learn about the life of the prophet peace be upon them. Students are also given an opportunity to learn about the biography of the Khalifa's and companions of the prophet (peace be upon him).

Hadith (Riyadh us saliheen): Students are taught in such a manner that they are given real-world lessons of how to implement the saying of the prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) in their lifestyle while living in the 21st century. The main theme is the student becomes an example of a follower of the Sunnah of the beloved Prophet Sallallahu Alaihi wa salam inwardly and outwardly to attain the ultimate objective of Pleasure of Allah tala.

Tazkiyah (implementing purification to benefit one's character); this is such a course design in a way to implement all the teaching of Allah and Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) in a practical methodology. We teach students that as well as Ta'leem (knowledge) there should also be a strong emphasis on the practical teachings of Islam (Tarbiyah). Students are also given opportunity in lesson and outside for any pastoral support from an Islamic perspective.

Assemblies/celebrations

During the year we also have an afternoon of assemblies to commemorate celebrations like Mawlid un nabi. In these assemblies' learners contribute by either reading poems/nasheeds or giving speaches to each other about the importance of this event. Knowledgeable scholars from the community are also used to give a lecture to the students about the significance of this event. A short zikr and dua is also read.

Ofsted good rating for Bolton Islamic Girls School



A SCHOOL where pupils "feel happy and safe" has been judged to be good by the Government's education watchdog.



<u>Bolton</u> Islamic Girls School in Great Lever has been lifted out of the requires improvement category following an inspection by Ofsted.

Inspectors reported: "Pupils feel happy and safe at Bolton Islamic Girls School.

"Pupils know that leaders expect the best from them in all that they do. Pupils make every effort to realise leaders' ambitions for them to become proud, British, Muslim young women. They work hard, developing confidence and self-assurance."

Teaching is said to have improved, with staff having 'strong' subject knowledge with some having high-level qualifications in their subjects.

"As a result, pupils build their knowledge effectively and achieve well," stated inspectors.

Pupils were described as having positive attitudes to their work, and their good behaviour means they learn well.

Inspectors said: "Pupils have high attendance, considering the effects of the pandemic."

And they found that the students were well placed to move to the next stage of their education.

Leaders were found to support staff effectively and manage their workloads.

Headteacher Dr Zakia Maqbool said: "Amongst all the other pressures this year due to Covid, this is an amazing achievement for our school. Especially, given we got a requires improvement in November, 2019.

"Since <u>then</u> staff and governors have worked tirelessly to ensure our school is a school that continues to be able to facilitate the needs of our learners.

"The community have again supported our <u>school</u> and this is an outstanding achievement for us."

She added: "Our school suffered deeply with Covid, whereby students and staff – four out of 12 – had to deal with the loss of close family members due to Covid."

But Dr Maqbool said they stayed dedicated to the teaching of young people.

The headteacher said the improvements were also thanks to the community, staff, governors and the learners.
